Ben, Chiara, Eva, George, Jayden and Lucas, our St Teresa Pupil Chaplains and Prayer Leaders retold the life of Mother Teresa and we sang 'The Servant King', reminding us how Jesus calls us to serve others.. Finally, we sang, 'Shine', asking God to help us to shine and to send us out to help others.

The celebration ended with a special playtime and delicious yellow St Teresa biscuits, baked by Mrs Ertan and her team. It was wonderful to see all of the St Teresa's children from Reception to Year 6 playing together in the sunshine and enjoying their treats!



The SSAS Big Draw



This October we are very excited to be celebrating The Big Draw Festival, an annual, worldwide celebration of drawing and visual literacy.

The first Big Draw started with a one-day activity in October 2000 – since then, it's grown into a worldwide, annual, and month-long celebration. Over 500,000 people participate every year now, and it's even broken two world records, one for the longest drawing in the world, and one for the greatest number of people simultaneously drawing!

2022 is the 22nd anniversary of the festival, and the theme is 'Come Back To Colour'. The aim of this theme is to bring back a feeling of vitality and love after a tough few years and to give people the chance to see the beauty in the world again through the power of art.

At SSAS, we have been celebrating the colour in the world around us in all its richness and diversity by creating self-portraits. It has been fantastic to see children from Nursery to Year 6 expressing themselves through art, observing their features in a mirror and reflecting what they perceive onto their paper, learning about face proportions and symmetry, taking inspiration from famous artists Victoria Topping and Julian Opie.

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Changing for P.E.

Dear Parents/Carers

Over the first few weeks of this term, we have been reviewing our changing for PE policy. Following discussions with parents, pupils and staff members, we will be running a trial period of a new policy.

After half term, all children taking part in PE during the school day should still come into school wearing full school uniform. However, they will be allowed to go home at the end of the day dressed in their school PE kit. This does not include Reception, who will be asked to attend school in their PE kit and will remain in their kit for the whole day.

All pupils should have a PE kit in school on the days that they have curriculum PE lessons. If your child attends an after-school sports club, they will also be expected to bring in their PE kit on the day that they have their club.

There are a number of benefits to running this trial. Firstly, cutting out the time taken to change back into school uniform at the end of PE lessons will ensure that we maximize our PE teaching time and therefore help to keep our children active for the recommended 60 minutes a day (180 minutes for EYFS). Secondly, parents will be able to check on a more regular basis that the PE kit fits appropriately and is clean, an issue which several parents have raised with us.

At St Alban & St Stephen, our young children (e.g. Reception, Y1, Y2 and Y3) will change together with a supervising member of staff to help with any issues or problems in changing. Older children will get changed separately, using available appropriate spaces. Any supervising staff member is to follow the Department of Education guidance at all times.

Here is a reminder of the School PE Kit as specified on the website:

- \Rightarrow white T shirt with or without school logo
- \Rightarrow red shorts
- ⇒ dark green or black jogging bottoms (however, as some parents have already bought plain dark tracksuit bottoms, these will be accepted for this year)
- \Rightarrow (for colder weather) school jumper or dark green sweatshirt (no slogans)
- \Rightarrow trainers.

Online Safety

Teaching children how to stay safe online is a vital part of our Computing and PSHE curriculum. However, the majority of children's online activity takes place while they are at home. In order to support parents and carers to keep their children safe in the digital world, we will be including regular online safety articles in our weekly newsletters in addition to our e-safety workshops which will be running next year. Top Tips for Parents

Talk with your child about responsible use of their phone

Discuss what is okay and not okay to use their phone for. Talk about time limits and expectations of where the device can and cannot be used, this could include things like the phone being charged outside their bedroom overnight.

Discuss what to do if something upsetting or worrying happens

Give them the strategies they need in case something concerning happens whilst they are using their device. This could be to lock the screen and tell an adult, to make a report to the platform they are using, or to block the user.

Explore parental controls

Take a look at the controls available both on the phone itself and on your home Wi-Fi. Talk these through with your child too. Parental controls are a helpful tool, but an open conversation with your child is the most important thing.

How to start a conversation with your child about using a phone safely:

Why do you want to get a phone?

Whilst deciding if it is time for your child to have their first phone can be a great opportunity to find out what your child expects to use their phone for. This could be for connecting with friends, playing games, for keeping in touch whilst out of the house or other reasons.

What do you like about using your phone?

You can ask your child about their favourite apps or games, what they like using their phone for, or ask them to show you how to play or use their favourite game or website.

What would you do if something worrying or upsetting happened on your phone? You can ask them about the places they can go to find safety advice, find out what they know about privacy settings, and ask them how to report or block services they use.

How can we do more online together?

Ask your child about activities or games that you could enjoy as a family; this can be a great time to establish a family agreement to manage your families' time online.
