



Drop Off and Pick Up

The doors open at 8.45am and close at 8.55am. There is a soft start to the day and when the children arrive, they start their SODA (Start of Day Activity) before lessons begin. Children arriving after 8.55 will be marked late.

Please help your child settle by allowing them to come into the classroom independently.

School finishes at 3.05pm (Reception) 3.15pm (KS1) 3.20pm (KS2)

Other adults who regularly pick up your child should be added to Arbor. For one-off occasions, please inform the teacher or email the office with the adult's name, their role, and whether your child is expecting to be picked up by this person or not. Children in Nursery to Year 4 can only be picked up by an older sibling who is aged 14+ (Year 10+) - you must inform the Office of this in writing or by email.

Lunches

We encourage parents to discuss school lunches with their child and to book their lunch choices in advance using Arbor.

This ensures that parents help their child to choose a meal they know that they will like and also means a quicker start to the school day.

- Red: Meat/Fish option
- Green: Vegetarian option
- Yellow: Roll or sandwich
- Blue: Jacket Potato

Alternatively, your child can bring in their own packed lunch. No glass bottles, fizzy drinks or any food containing nuts are allowed.

KS2 School Stationery

Children may bring one **simple** pencil case **labelled** with their name containing:

- > A pencil and sharpener; 2 spare pencils
- > A black handwriting pen (not black biro) and a purple pen
- > A rubber
- Colouring pencils and felt tips
- ➤ A glue stick
- > A ruler 30cm

Please ask your child to tell you when they need replacements. Stationery can be provided in school if your child does not want to bring their own pencil case.

Uniform

Please ensure all items of clothing are CLEARLY MARKED WITH YOUR CHILD'S NAME.

- Black school shoes must be worn no trainers.
- Long hair must be tied up with simple black, green or red hair ties.
- Jewellery children may only wear simple stud earrings and a silent watch or Fitbit (no smartwatches allowed). No necklaces, bracelets, charity bands etc are allowed.
- A warm, waterproof coat must be provided as children play outside.
- Red caps must be worn on sunny days and during trips.
- Summer uniform can be worn for the first Autumn half term.

PE Kit

Please ensure all items of clothing are CLEARLY MARKED WITH YOUR CHILD'S NAME.

- Our PE days are Monday and Wednesday. Children should wear their P.E. kit to school on P.E. days.
- Plain white T shirt (with or without school logos but no other logos)
- Red shorts/black leggings or tracksuit bottoms
- Red hoodie with NO DRAWSTRING (plain red or with school logo but no other logos) or school jumper/cardigan
- Plain trainers with non-marking soles
- No jewellery should be worn.

Reading in Year 3

- ➤ Reading frequently is important so please aim to read daily at home reading books and other reading material from a variety of genres (e.g. non-fiction, magazines, newspapers, recipes, poetry.)
- Develop Comprehension by questioning children (VIPERS Vocabulary, Inference, Predict, Explain, Retrieval, Summarise)
- > Guided reading sessions in school to teach skills of reading.
- ➤ Library books please read and return for weekly library sessions

Spelling in Year 3

- > Weekly spelling patterns taught and homework given
- Prefixes e.g. re- and dis-
- ➤ Suffixes e.g. —ly and -ic
- > Spelling and reading Year 3 and 4 words from memory.

Writing in Year 3

- > Children use pencils until they achieve their pen licence
- Cursive (joined handwriting)
- Writing for a range of purposes e.g. non-chronological reports, narrative, explanations, persuasion, biography, letter writing
- > Reading widely will benefit children in their writing ability

Maths in Year 3

- ➤ Place value, rounding numbers
- Written addition & subtraction.
- ➤ Multiplication & division facts and formal written layout
- Fact families and applying the inverse.
- ➤ Multiplication 3, 4 and 8 times tables
- \triangleright Division 1, 2, 3, 5, 4 and 8 times tables, long division
- > Multiply & divide by 10
- ➤ Measures measuring and problem solving
- Angles, right angles and estimation. Perpendicular and parallel lines, vertical and horizontal Lines.
- ▶ Perimeter

- ➤ 3-D and 2-D Shape drawing 2D shapes, building 3D shapes and identifying the properties of both
- ➤ Place value and decimal numbers estimation, comparing and rounding, Regrouping, ten times greater and ten times smaller
- ➤ Fractions ordering and comparing fractions, adding and subtracting Fractions and problem solving
- ➤ Time analogue & digital clocks, telling the time

Home Learning

- ➤ Termly Home Learning grid 6 pieces including 2 RE Following staff and parent feedback, we are reviewing our homework system. Parents will be asked to contribute their views. For this term, homework will remain the same
- ➤ Times Tables Rock Stars & Numbots

How you can help at home

- > Reading and asking questions about books
- > Real life Maths, e.g. telling the time and cooking
- ➤ Encourage children to complete homework and to present neatly
- > Having named equipment in school
- Talking to your children about what they have been learning to encourage oracy skills



Smartphone-Free School

A significant number of St Albans primary schools have agreed to support the 'Smartphone-Free Childhood initiative. https://smartphonefreechildhood.co.uk/https://delaysmartphones.org.uk/

By "smartphones", we refer to phones that are able to access the internet, as opposed to old-fashioned mobile phones that can only text and make phone calls.

After consulting with staff, parents and governors, we have agreed that at SAS primary-aged pupils should not have smartphones.

Primary-aged pupils should not be on any asocial media including WhatsApp, Snapchat, Instagram or TikTok (all have a 13+ age-restriction).



What does this mean for you?

From September 2025, no SAS child will be able to bring a smartphone to school when they walk to and from school. Year 5 and 6 children who walk to and from school by themselves can, if parents wish, bring a tracker or an old-fashioned phone which does not connect to the internet eg a Nokia. All phones must be handed into the class teacher at the start of the day and will be returned at the end of the day.

We ask parents not to buy their child a smartphone while in primary school. We ask that parents do not allow their child to access age-inappropriate social media and join WhatsApp groups.

Parents on school grounds are not allowed to use mobile phones unless outside the school gates. This is a safeguarding issue. It also sends a message to our children that they are more important than our phones and sets a positive example.

Year 5 and 6 parents will need to complete the walk home from school form which was sent to you.



Parent Helpers

The support of parents is of enormous benefit to the children and we warmly welcome it.

We already have a team of fantastic parent volunteers who read with children and help in the library every week. If you are interested in becoming a regular volunteer, please notify the office and further information will follow.

(Please note that in line with Hertfordshire County Council, all parents working in school will be asked to apply for police clearance.)
